DISCUSSION QUESTIONS

PRE-READING QUESTIONS:

1. Who are the Lost Boys of South Sudan?

What caused the Lost Boys to flee their homes? What is the source of political turmoil?
Discuss life in the Kakuma Refugee camp. What are some of the struggles the boys had to face prior to coming to the United States? What is a refugee camp? How are refugee camps run?

Part One:

PAGES 1-55:

1. What was your average day at the age of 5? How does this vary from the story of Alepho?

2. Before arriving to the United States how did the boys perceive the US? How is their perception wrong? How is their perception correct?

3. Identify examples of "American Norms" that are culturally shocking to the Lost Boys of South Sudan? In your opinion, are these positive norms or are they negative norms? Why do you believe that?

4. How does having background knowledge or cultural context play a large role in the conversations that take place between Judy and the boys? Why is this a challenge for both parties?

5. How do the boys value education? Is this the same or different from what you see in your community? Why do you believe this to be?

6. What are Judy's fears about being a mentor for Alepho, Benson, and Lino?

PAGES 56-89:

1. What emotions do you imagine you would experience moving to a foreign country? What fears would you face?

2. Create a list of all of the new things that Alepho learns about America within his first few weeks.

3. Alepho wonders the question, "Do people take time to know you in America?" (pg 58) What would your response to this question be? Why do you believe that?

PAGES 56-89 CONTINUED:

4. How many individuals have been displaced by the Sudan Civil War? (pg 59) What is the cause of this turmoil?

5. Discuss the struggles the boys will face as they go out to find a job. Why do you believe they will face these struggles? Is there a way to overcome?

6. What is the relationship between Alepho, Benson, and Lino?

7. Why is Peter, Benson and Alepho's brother not in the United States?

8. How is Judy's perception of a refugee camp different from that of a real refugee camp? Has your perception of a refugee camp shifted?

9. Judy mentions the busyness of the United States, do you find this to be true of the culture in your community? Why or why not?

10. Judy asks the questions, "They survived a war; did that equip them to thrive in a ghetto?" What do you believe the answer to this is? Why do you believe that to be true?11. Identify two observations that Judy makes while at the ocean and two observations that Alepho makes while at the ocean. Identify the similarities and differences.

12. Why was Alepho so intrigued with the women at the beach? How did this vary from his home?

13. What did the boys eat at the Kakuma Refugee Camp? What did they eat on their journey to the Refugee Camp?

14. What happens to the young boys and girls in their villages when they are attacked? Why is it that the girls can't run like the boys can? How is this culturally different or similar from your own culture?

15. What are some of the character traits of Alepho, Benson, and Lino. Of these character traits which of them do you believe will help them adapt to life in America? Which of them will make adaptation a challenge?

16. As the boys are learning how to interview for a job they are identifying different ways Americans greet each other. How is this different from their own culture?

1. What is acculturation? Give examples of acculturation from the novel and from your own life.

2. What is the difference between how Sudanese define beauty and how Americans define beauty?

3. How did Alepho first hear about what education is?

4. Alepho mentions that he has fallen between two cultures. He left his home so early and is now a part of the American culture that he does not understand. Describe the emotions that come with that challenge. Have you ever found yourself in a similar situation?

5. What does Alepho realize about his original perception of the United States? How is his new perspective different?

7. Identify the similarities and differences between Alephos experience at the baseball game vs. Judy's experience.

4. How can language be the greatest barrier to acculturation? Where have you seen examples of this?

5. What is the process for a refugee to travel to another country?

6. Describe Maslow's Hierarchy of Needs. What is the importance of Maslow's Hierarchy of Needs in the mentor process?

7. Describe life as a refugee.

8. What did the boys misinterpret as gunshots?

1. How did 9-11 influence the influx of refugees to the United States?

2. Because of the boys background knowledge of war, what new fears are now introduced by the 9-11 attacks?

3. How do the boys perceive the "suburbs" of San Diego?

4. Alepho asks Judy if "Americans will blame the Lost Boys for the attack?" Why does he believe this to be true?

5. Why does Judy struggle to decide if she should loan the boys \$600? What do you think you would do? Why?

6. What are Alephos looming fears?

7. What advice did Alepho receive from his father on their walk home from the mediation?
